LIVING AVP: REMEMBERING RAY BARNES

Ray Barnes, a.k.a. Sensational Shakim, a former AVP inside coordinator at Auburn, passed away recently, leaving a large hole in the re-entry work done in New York State. Reflecting on his life, I thought of some of the guides to Transforming Power and how he embodied them.

Be willing to suffer for what is important. Ray was rather a legend in Auburn for never once going to commissary in his 27 years of incarceration. He was not going to give his money to DOCS; instead he sent it all home to his wife Lorraine to help purchase their house in Auburn. If he needed something, he would trade for it or do without.

Learn to trust your inner sense of when to act. Ray was very concerned about the safety and welfare of children. He was a major part of the Youth Assistance Program (YAP) in Auburn and counseled teachers, parents and probation officers in helping youth at risk. If a child seemed to be troubled, he advised that an adult ask him or her to

draw a picture or find one in a magazine to indicate what is going on. Recognizing and reporting abuse is too much to expect from a child, he said. He also suggested using Light and Livelies in the visiting room as he had with his daughter Roxie both for fun and to help her learn her alphabet and math facts.

Be patient and persistent. Ray shared that he had lost contact with some of his family members following his incarceration but that he kept up the letters and cards, especially to nieces and nephews, who were not old enough to make decisions about who should be in their lives and who should not. Sure enough, when they were older, these nieces and nephews reached out to him. It didn't seem to bother him that it would take years; he seemed to know and accept that.

Build a community based on honesty, respect and caring. For Ray, community was all about love. Ray's first speaking engagement shortly after his release in 2005 was at the school where I teach.

The administration had no problem allowing Ray to speak to the students soon after his release because teachers had met him through the YAP program and they trusted him. This was a follow-up to community building (AVP) workshops held at school. Ray began all of his public addresses with and repeated several times during the course of a workshop: "My beloved brothers and my beloved sisters...". All people were beloved to Ray. It didn't matter if you were a judge, a correctional officer, a teacher, youth at risk or wearing state greens. His passionate speaking engagements continued as he worked for the Center for Community Alternatives in Syracuse as a case manager. He spoke to district attorneys and people in power regarding parole-- a long way from YAP and AVP but then not really. Ray loved people, listening to them, laughing with them, leading "Lean on Me" at the end of workshops with his beautiful voice and above all, cherishing his family. I cannot think of a better legacy.
