POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS FOR JANUARY 2014

The Monthly Meeting opened with a period of worship about 11:50a.m. and approved the minutes from the last meeting, October 2013.

Attending: Ruth Anne Bradley, Larry Buffam, David Connelly, Anne Dalton, Barry Kahn, Jeff Layton, Howard Nelson, Sally Otis, Dill Otis, Hannah Richter, Andrew Simkin, Jane Simkin, Paul Simkin, and Bill Tyler.

Eddie Richter and Carly Pearson have changed their original plans to use the meetinghouse to be married in August. They will be married in Portland, Oregon.

Jack Charles has stepped off the Nominating Committee; Howard is volunteering to complete Jack's term. Linda Simkin had coincidentally been asked; Monthly Meeting will ask her to fill out Jack's term while Howard will serve on the committee for the sake of continuity.

The Monthly Meeting discussed whether nominations of the Nominating Committee should be publicized before the Annual Meeting. The Monthly Meeting is clear that publication is appropriate.

The Monthly Meeting 2014 annual budget was approved, based on the Finance Committee's proposed budget, with the following changes:

- \$20 will be added to the motto calendars to cover postage.
- The budget had decreased the amount allocated to the New York Yearly Meeting to \$5,000, from \$6,000. When some members expressed discomfort, the Monthly Meeting discussed it and restored the budget line to \$6,000.
- The Monthly Meeting separated the Outreach & Religious Education category, increasing the \$225 to \$250 and allocating \$125 to each.
- The budget includes no increase for the pastor's housing and salary. We will hold with that number keeping in mind needs to adjust for inflation in future years.

- Scholarships, budgeted \$1,000, will be dropped to zero; requested and approved scholarships will be drawn from one of the meeting's funds. Last year it came out of the Searing Fund.
- Also, Peace and Social Action was asked to reappraise donations to several agencies to which we donate \$50 to \$100 and report to Monthly Meeting.

The changes total \$45 increase to the proposed budget, for a total 2014 budget \$43,545.

The Monthly Meeting approved reserving for roof replacement \$7,000 from the Memorial Fund and \$3,000 from the Youth Fund. We approved a draft letter, with minor changes, to members, attenders and others concerned about our Meetinghouse to be mailed in May informing them of our need for up to \$20,000 and a brief notice of the project in Prism. Recent bids are from D&J, of Ovid, \$26,200, and Signor, of Genoa, \$31,500.

A marriage of Craig Kukuk and A.T. Miller took place in the Meetinghouse in Dec. 31, 2013.

Eighteen adult associate Monthly Meeting members were identified and mailed sixteen letters asking whether they wish to continue as full members. Of the six responses so far, four will continue as members: Bethea Brice, Llewellyn Foulke, Laura Sullivan, and Kevin Sullivan. Two wished to discontinue, Lucie Heinekamp Gill and Eve Moora Klamm.

The Monthly Meeting closed with silence about 2:35 p.m.



MOVIE NIGHT – “5 BROKEN CAMERAS”

The Peace and Social Action committee is sponsoring the viewing of the movie “5 Broken Cameras” at the Meetinghouse on February 7th at 7:30pm. Please join us for a viewing of the movie, snacks and discussion. All are welcome.

“The first-ever Palestinian film to be nominated for best Documentary Feature by A.M.P.A.S®, the critically-acclaimed 5 BROKEN CAMERAS is a deeply personal, first-hand account of life and non-violent resistance in Bil’in, a West Bank village surrounded by Israeli settlements. Shot by Palestinian farmer Emad Burnat, who bought his first camera in 2005 to record the birth of his youngest son, Gibreel, the film was co-directed by Burnat and Guy Davidi, an Israeli filmmaker. Structured in chapters around the destruction of each one of Burnat’s cameras, the filmmakers’ collaboration follows one family’s evolution over five years of village upheaval. As the years pass in front of the camera, we witness Gibreel grow from a newborn baby into a young boy who observes the world unfolding around him with the astute powers of perception that only children possess. Burnat watches from behind the lens as olive trees are bulldozed, protests intensify and lives are lost in this cinematic diary and unparalleled record of life in the West Bank.”

Meeting for Business

Probably the first thing to be considered about business meeting is that its full name is Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business. Business meetings are intended to be conducted in a similar worshipful spirit, a sense of the same expectation of the active presence of the Spirit and a seeking of some kernel of the truth with which Meeting for Worship is conducted every week. Deliberations and decisions about various items of business are intended to reflect this presence of the Spirit.

Everyone is welcome and valued at meetings for business just as at weekly meeting for worship. The Spirit may speak through anyone present, whether it is their first time or they have attended many times before.

On the importance of deep listening at Meeting for business: “..... a willingness to listen to what others have to say rather than to persuade them to one’s own point of view represents what is right and proper.” (Punshon, Encounter with Silence, p 98)

We come to meeting for business with agenda items hopefully well prepared and seasoned, but also in an open spirit ready to discern the best course forward, which may well be postponement as Friends wait on greater clarity. If decisions are made, they are made in unity rather than through voting. The difference between unity and consensus has been explained but is beyond the scope of this short article.

Friends’ business meeting has traditionally been the place for the raising of individual concerns or leadings. This is the place where they can be aired, considered, tested and responded to by the community. This can be a deepening experience for the individual and for the rest of the group.

ROOF FUND FOR MEETINGHOUSE

The Building Committee has recommended replacement of the Meetinghouse roof. The work could be done in 2014 if we generate sufficient funds. The estimated total cost is \$30,000-35,000. The Finance Committee has established a Roof Fund, with a current balance of \$12,600, consisting of one earmarked donation received in the amount of \$2,600, plus \$10,000 from other previously-donated money. 

Through simple, communal living, Volunteers learn to care for self and others. QVS Volunteers will share living space, meals, care for the home, and all aspects of day to day life. You are not required to be a Quaker to participate in QVS, but you should come prepared to deeply engage in Quaker worship and practice, and be genuinely open to sharing your spiritual journey with others.


