POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES AUGUST 17TH, 2014

The Aug. 17, 2014 Poplar Ridge Friends Monthly Meeting opened with a period of worship about 11:45 a.m. and read the minutes from the July meeting.

Attending is David Connelly, Anne Dalton, Jim Frisch, Jeff Layton, Sally Otis, Dill Otis, Bess Simkin, Jane Simkin, Linda Simkin, Paul Simkin, Kate Serrine, and Bill Tyler,

Dill updated us on the roof project. It is nearly completed and the job looks good, in Dill's judgment. The Building Committee has added to the project replacement of roofing over shed and entry, since they were funded privately and anonymously. For the overall project, there remains about \$8,000 in funding needed. We hope to pay the contractor in full by spring. We are applying to New York Yearly Meeting for funds for assistance.

At one rainstorm there was leakage north of the chimney, which stained a patch above the vestibule. The contractor has agreed to cover any damage, but we will be handling repairs ourselves.

Sally Otis reported for Ministry and Council Committee that the committee talked about the Meeting For Discernment on July 27. "We feel we heard the importance of community expressed," she said, and included a desire for spoken message, silence and music, and to "maintain our friendliness for all who entered." We discussed the future: there was some excitement because some members have offered to give monthly messages, but the committee is not yet ready to put their names forward. That would tentatively be for an interim year while we decide how to proceed. "There is a sense that a way is opening for the future of our meeting," she said.

We know the talents Ruth has and they are unique; we may not be able to replace all of them. For instance, how to arrange for visiting hospitalized and homebound people. Some members are visiting case-by-case now. Ruth returns after a sabbatical soon and will continue as pastor for three months, a valuable time for us to discover such needs. She has said she has

already contacted local clergy to help us with people who may need professional help while she is on sabbatical.

There was a concern that Ministry and Council fully engage the Monthly Meeting in our search for our new pastoral leadership.

We agreed that an honorarium should be offered to people who present messages to us. There was a question whether Monthly Meeting has discontinued that earlier practice. Ministry and Council will consider what amount the honorarium should be.

Jeff gave a brief Funding Committee report. We have cash for a little under 35 percent of our budget, short about \$28,000, and we are about two-thirds into the fiscal year.

Kate Serrine visited and told us she is beginning a worship group in Odessa, near Watkins Glen, and is seeks our meeting's support.

DID YOU EVER WONDER?

Did you ever wonder about Bayard Rustin?

Bayard Rustin, Quaker activist and chief organizer for the 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, lived such a life of inspiration. Last fall, Rustin posthumously received the Presidential Medal of Freedom honoring his life and work for equality and dignity for all people.

Rustin is best known for being the organizer of the March on Washington, but he also shaped the nonviolent philosophy of the movement. In 1956, Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr invited Rustin to come to Montgomery, Alabama to help organize the emergent bus boycott. King's home had been bombed in February of that year, and in response, King applied for a concealed carry permit in Alabama. The state was reluctant to grant such permits to African Americans: King was deemed "unsuitable" and the permit was denied, so instead he kept guns at his home.

When Rustin arrived at King's home, he was disturbed that he was greeted at the door by armed watchmen. When Rustin visited King with journalist Bill Worthy, Worthy almost sat on a pistol. Rustin said, "Watch out, Bill, there's a gun on the chair." Rustin helped King realize that nonviolence was a way of life, not merely a tactic, and persuaded him to learn about and adopt the principles of Gandhian nonviolent direct action.

Rustin lived with remarkable integrity-he never hid the fact that he was gay, he never bowed to judgments others made about his sexuality. He said, "My activism did not spring from my being gay, or, for that matter, from my being black. Rather, it is rooted fundamentally in my Quaker upbringing and the values that were instilled in me by my grandparents who reared me. Those values are based on the concept of a single human family and the belief that all members of that family are equal."

This is an opportunity for us to bear witness, to join the largest climate march in history, to march together as Friends. Friends are gathering from across the Yearly Meeting and across the country to join in this historic march. Come, be a part of it.

There will be a bus leaving from Ithaca meetinghouse at rise of Farmington Scipio Regional Meeting's Fall Gathering, at about 4:00 PM, and going that night to 15th Street Meeting. The cost is \$25 per person, round-trip. Those that can camp out in the meetinghouse, sleeping on cushions from the benches, are welcome to do so. Those that cannot will be matched up with Friends offering limited hospitality in the area.

We will gather the morning before the march to worship at 15th Street Meeting, and then go to join the Quaker contingent near Central Park (exact location to be announced). I'm told that First Nations Peoples and religious organizations will be at the front of the march. The bus will take Friends back to Ithaca MM after the march, arriving around 8:00-9:00 pm Sunday.

With our future on the line and the whole world watching, we'll take a stand to demand that world leaders, and particularly our own, take action to address climate change. See you there!

IDENTIFYING NELSON / BUSCANDO A ROBERTO

Nelson deWitt will be showing his documentary, Identifying Nelson / Buscando a Roberto on September 6th at 7:00 PM at the Morgan Opera House in Aurora, NY. It is a "documentary about how "finding what connects us can change your world."

In 1997, Nelson deWitt, a 16-year-old adoptee from Boston, Massachusetts, discovered that he had been identified as one Roberto Coto, an infant who disappeared in 1982 after a deadly government raid on three guerrilla safe houses in Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

The raid rescued a kidnapped businessman and also resulted in the disappearance of a dozen Salvadoran revolutionaries, including Roberto's biological mother, Ana Milagro Escobar. Today, a generation after one of the bloodiest conflicts of the Cold War, the wounds of the Civil War in El Salvador are still open and the truth about them has been obscured.

Nelson/Roberto has determined that sharing his search for the truth about his story is his way of making a difference. At the heart of Nelson/Roberto's search is the simple belief that finding what makes us all alike—or connected—can change the world.

In addition to Nelson deWitt presenting his film, his mother Margaret Ward, wife of Wells College President, Tom deWitt, will be sharing some thoughts from her book *Missing Mila, Finding Family* on the same subject.


EVENTS AT HOWLAND STONE STORE MUSEUM
