## **CAMP CASPER GREGORY**

On July 5, 2015 as the sun lights the eastern shore of Cayuga Lake, Camp Gregory will celebrate 75 years of providing outdoor experiences for the area's children. Camp Gregory is a small rustic camp built on an idyllic camp setting with forest, lake shore, gorges, hiking trails, sports fields and campfire pits. The main lodge and sleeping cabins provide the indoor shelter for eating, sleeping, activities, quiet time and time for the campers to turn strangers into friends. The well-trained staff prepares a dynamic and energetic program including nature study, athletics, team building, evening game shows, social skills building, crafts, music and many other fun activities. The waterfront provides opportunities for swimming, boating, aquatic habitat study, campfires or just enjoying the view of Cayuga Lake.

The camp began in 1941 by Caspar Gregory. His vision became the Camp's Mission, which is to offer opportunities for campers to live and work together in nature to experience the physical, emotional and environmental dimensions of life. The Resident Camp and the Day Camp stimulate campers to develop new skills in working together, in protecting the environment and in enjoying the outdoors. The fun-filled and educational week create camaraderie among staff and campers, creating relationships that last a lifetime.

The camp is located just south of the Village of Aurora near Long Point State Park. It is open for interested groups for rentals. ### **NYYM PEACE & PLANET NPT MARCH**

The NYYM Witness Coordinating Committee is forwarding this invitation to join the Peace & Planet NPT Mobilization & March.

From Joseph Gerson, Director of Programs AFSC, Northeast Region:  
The Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, which went into force in 1970, rests on three pillars. Non-nuclear states foreswore ever developing or possessing nuclear weapons. In return the P-5 nuclear powers (U.S., U.K., Russia, China and France,) committed to engage in good faith negotiations for the complete elimination of their nuclear arsenals and recognized the right of non-nuclear weapons states to generate nuclear power for peaceful purposes, a flaw in the treaty. (India, Pakistan and Israel are not treaty signatories, and

North Korea withdrew from the Treaty.) Every five years, a “Review Conference” is held at the U.N., providing the opportunity for nations and civil society to press for full implementation of the Treaty. This year’s Review conference, begins April 27, and is critically important in the new era of U.S.-Russian confrontation.

The International Planning Group for the 2015 NPT Review Mobilization: For Abolition, Climate and Justice is organizing a Peace and Planet NPT Review mobilization with two primary goals: impact the Review Conference and build broader and more issue-integrated movements for the longer-term. Primary themes of our mobilization are nuclear weapons abolition, peace, moving the money from military spending to meeting human needs, social justice and creating an environmentally sustainable world. Activities will include:

- **International conference April 24-25** - The conference is being organized on the basis of five themes: nuclear weapons abolition, move the money (cutting military spending to prevent wars and fund essential human needs), climate change and environmental justice, the new era of global military tensions and wars, and racism and militarism.
- **Interfaith service rally, march, festival and petition presentations, Sunday the 26<sup>th</sup>**
- “Fact-a-day count down” social media campaign
- Petitions
- Global peace wave.

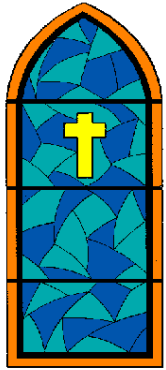

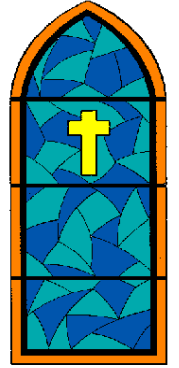
