POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES FOR MARCH 20, 2016.

The meeting commenced at 12:00 noon. Attending were Ruth Bradley, Charlie Weld, Larry Buffam, Anne Dalton, Sally Otis, Linda Simkin, Paul Simkin, Dill Otis, Jane Simkin, Andy Simkin, and Barry Kahn.

Anne Dalton read the minutes from the February 21 meeting, and noted that the memorial minute approved then was ready for submission to Friends Journal, but needs Bill's birthplace. Ruth and Andy undertook to look for that information.

Sally Otis gave a report from the Ministry and Counsel committee. Annual meeting is scheduled for April 10. Deb First will give a message on April 17, followed by a Soup and Sharing presentation with Ted First, on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. There will be a memorial worship service for Jay Ar dai on April 23, 11:00AM, at the Meetinghouse, with a reception to follow at Dugan's restaurant.

Anne mentioned that Suzanne O'Hara had requested that a policy be developed regarding selection of material for the PRISM monthly newsletter. This will be referred to the Outreach committee, with Mary Lou Charles and Laura Buffam to be invited to participate. Once a draft policy is prepared, it will come back to Monthly meeting for approval.

There was discussion of the annual State of the Meeting Report. A draft was read by Sally Otis. It was approved with some edits, with thanks to the drafters.

A report on the State of the Meeting from the Cayuga County Correctional Facility worship group was read aloud by Dill Otis, and received with appreciation.

Andy Simkin reported, on behalf of the Peace and Social Action Committee, that several inputs had been drafted for the FCNL Legislative Priorities Statement, but had not been melded into a single text. It was decided that the text should be finalized by the Peace and Social Action Committee, and described in the committee's annual report to be given at the upcoming annual meeting in April. The text will then be sent by the Committee to FCNL.

For the Building Committee, Larry Buffam reported that the Building Committee is making plans to insulate the basement, starting with the children's area. The work is planned to commence on March 28, using volunteers for all labor. The Meeting approved expenditure of approximately \$1,000 for materials for the children's area. Total cost for insulating the basement is estimated at \$5-6,000; higher if windows are replaced. Future plans for a new heating system for the Meetinghouse will be developed after the insulation is done.

NIGHTENGALES SING

Nightengales will be gathering at Hannah's home on the weekend of 22 April to 24 April starting Friday evening. Singing will be enjoyed by all who care to sing or just listen: Friday evening, Saturday morning, Saturday afternoon and Saturday evening. You are welcome to join us if you would like and stay for an evening of singing. The Nightengales will sing at the Meeting House Sunday morning prior to Meeting for worship. State of the Meeting March 2016
Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting

Query for State of the meeting report. What is the spiritual condition of your meeting?
Reflection on the essence of what makes us Friends

Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting has undergone change as a community with grace and compassion for one another. After more than a decade, our pastor retired at the end of 2014, and through a communal process, we have found a way forward over the last year. While we continue to discern as a community in what way the Spirit calls us to be a gathered body, we have Friends serving in a regular capacity to bring messages for the programmed part of our weekly worship, and another Friend has been called to serve in a pastoral care capacity. The Meeting is of one mind in these arrangements, which became clear in corporal discernment. We will continue to reassess how to be a community together in worship, practice and faith, and trust that we can do this with love and the guidance of Spirit. The positive manner in which our Meeting responded to the retirement of our pastor shows how we have grown spiritually. We have gone through the transition and have been strengthened by the process.

We find this collective sharing of pastoral responsibility an enriching experience of deep Spiritual gifts and broader ministry. We enjoy and benefit from the multitude of gifts from each other. The Light shines brightly through our regular unprogrammed worship, filled with meaningful sharing in silence and in vocal ministry. Two Spiritual Nurture groups, one for women and one for men, meet monthly and are well-attended and explore meaningful readings, queries, and topics of concern and support. We host midweek worship twice a month in members' homes. We hold monthly Quaker worship in Spanish for Spanish speaking farm workers and those from our meeting who speak some Spanish.

The Meeting is anchored by its generations of weighty and committed Friends, and its long tradition and rooted-ness in its place, and enriched by the many individuals from a wide geographic area who find a Spiritual home at Poplar Ridge. The tradition is broadly Christian, which is to say, faith in Christ and Friendship with Jesus nurtures and sustains many of us without making us resistant to continuing revelation and the deep Truth of those in our meeting to whom the Divine is revealed through other Groundings, as all of our cherished members and attenders remain seekers. We are a quiet and simple people with a deep faith. Friends are "there for one another." Worship is deep, gathered, centered, and often joyous. We love to sing, and are supported by several talented musicians. Our semi-programmed worship is central to who we are. Our silent waiting worship is deepened by the semi-programmed framework, and the program shapes itself around silence. This is how we understand ourselves to be inheritors of the Quaker tradition. We are represented at Quarterly and Yearly Meetings, Powell House retreats, and at Quaker gatherings and in Quaker organizations such as FCNL.

We lost two much-beloved men from our meeting since our last state of the meeting report. Friends mourned with them in their advancing illnesses, held their wives and families in the Light as best we could, and hold them now in whatever ways we can. Another stalwart Friend and member through our prison ministry also passed away and was the subject of a well-attended and profound memorial. Many Friends provide concrete practical support, and many

pray as we nurture each other and those around us in life's journey. Many of us have joined in work parties to assist one another in our community when the need arose

The meeting, like many faith communities, is aging, yet there are a small number of children currently being raised in the meeting. Our youth committee is energized and committed, offering care and fellowship for children every First Day. Some days there are only a couple of children present. Other days there are more, and our family Sundays attract as many as ten under the age of ten. Though the future is a concern and uncertain, we tend to leave that to God and let our lives speak as best we can in the present, including to the small number of children who grace us with their presence. At the closure of our Meetings for worship each week, we want to prolong the time we are together. Many of us stay for a long time and talk with each other. We love each other and want to stay and visit.

Our spiritual lives are reflected in many different ways. Our other ministries are thriving, such as Prison Worship groups, and numerous opportunities for fellowship with one another through Soup and Sharing, family night suppers, friendly potluck suppers in each others' homes, and community activities and charities.

Some of us are involved in supporting and visiting a sister community in San Pedro, El Salvador. For many years we have been involved in activities to support a summer camp for local children, Camp Gregory. We lend support to those with needs in our rural area. and participate in a wider Parish Lenten worship series. Many of our members and attenders are active in local town boards and a variety of civic activities. Through these secular activities, our Light reaches a wider circle in sometimes indirect, but important ways. We are active supporters and builders of our local community through planning and hosting annual Halloween and Christmas children's parties that are well attended, and an annual production of the medieval Shepherds' Play.

Our spiritual essence and our sense of community are made evident in many ways. Attenders often comment on the spirit present in our Meeting. They notice our acceptance of a vast diversity of faiths. A Central American member of our wider community met many of our members at social gatherings and wished she could join us for worship on First day, but her work schedule would not permit her. She was the impetus for the formation of our midweek Quaker worship group in Spanish.

As one recent new member observed "When I stepped through the door, I felt welcomed. I got that "take off your shoes feeling", as if I were at home. I knew I could be myself that this was a safe place."

Although our path together is not without some struggles, Poplar Ridge Monthly Meeting continues to be a place where Friends seek solace and share joy and spiritual community, and our meetings for worship are Spirit-filled. We are grateful for one another, for the faith that undergirds our fellowship and the Friendship that underlies our worship.

Cary Batten stated "I first joined the Quakers in 2010 and right from the start I felt it was the place for me because everyone in the group made me feel welcome. It is to the point now where I feel everyone is family to me.

I love the atmosphere and the way everyone encourages each other to do their best. When troubled times come along we help support each other through them.

The Cayuga Worship Group has helped me considerably with my giving back to the community through the projects which I do.

Being in the Quakers, my spiritual needs are met, and I look forward to continuing when I get out."

Nick Catalfamo and Cary Batten left the Cayuga Correctional Worship Group in 2012 for a program transfer. The facility where they were sent did not have a Quaker Meeting. They both attempted to begin a Quaker worship group at their new facility but were not successful. In 2015 both Nick and Cary returned to Cayuga Correctional Facility and were pleased and grateful to return to the Quaker Worship Group. As Nick stated "I was so excited to attend our worship meeting here, see the wonderful friends I missed and had left behind three years ago. I was saddened to learn that our meeting had lost a very dear friend, Bill Sims. A very good man who will surely be missed. Our meeting is a very close knit and caring worship group. We are always willing to help each other."

"I have been back at Cayuga for about five months and I always look forward to our meetings. As we prepared this year's State of the Meeting report, we read through the statement from the past years at Cayuga. It was good to reflect on past topics and memories which we have shared in this worship group. This is an excellent worship group which I missed very much and I am glad to be part of again." Our most recent member, Charles Jamison, states "Peace overcame me when I entered the room with my fellow Quaker worshippers." He continues, "I am a 37 year old Native American. I have had a very rough experience as I never imagined that I would have done something to land me here at Cayuga Correctional. I am coming to learn that good or bad, anything is possible and it is up to me what I learn from my experience and how I shall go forward. For a very long time I felt so low, filled with shame and remorse. I felt that I was no good and was angry that I woke up every day with a chance to start improving my life. I did not feel I deserved another chance even to wake up, to have the possibility of going home or of seeing my family again. All of that began to change when I arrived at Cayuga Correctional Facility in August 2015, I met a very good man, Cary Batten who kindly introduced me to the Quaker worship group. Through the loving hearts and open arms of the Quakers and AVP workshops I have embraced a chance to heal and to see the good within myself. I am learning to see the good in everyone else and everything in the universe as well. I am so grateful."

According to Gerry Weir "This has been a very emotional up and down year for our meeting. We lost a very dear friend, Bill Sims, whom I have known for over 27 years, I know that he started the Quaker Meeting in Auburn. Bill was also fundamental in starting our Quaker worship group here at Cayuga. Bill Sims was a very loving and humble person. He will be sadly missed. Rest in peace Bill.

Other members have been paroled (Kevin Johnson and Sylvester West). But we also gained some members back that had been transferred to Clinton to do a program and came back after three years (Nick and Cary).

We got two new members transferred from Auburn (Bernard Hatch and T. Chavez-Flores) Charlie Jamison has also joined our group as a new member. We have a really good Friends group with our outside members. We lose some and we gain some.

We are still working on and talking about the book The Wisdom to know the difference by Eileen Flanagan. We alternate between reading this book and discussion about a topic or reading which someone brings in.

The one problem we have is that our worship group only meets every second and fourth Fridays of the month. We wish we had more time, but we don't. God bless everyone.
