POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES FOR APRIL 10, 2016

The minutes from the March 20 meeting were read by Andy Simkin.

For the Peace and Social Action Committee, Eric Devin noted that the committee would, at the May monthly meeting, share its input to FCNL concerning legislative priorities.

Anne Dalton read aloud a draft policy for publication of written content in the PRISM newsletter. Concern was expressed over ambiguity in part of the draft. The Outreach committee will revise, drawing on inputs to be sent to Anne Dalton by email.

Annual reports from various committees were given orally and received by the meeting, with written versions to be provided electronically to Clerk Anne Dalton and Recording Clerk David Connelly.

The membership report was presented by Karen Simkin.

The Finance committee report was presented by Treasurer Jeffrey Layton.

The Building committee report, prepared by Larry Buffam, was read by Dill Otis. A note will be added regarding housekeeping: "routine housekeeping is done by volunteers on a rotating basis"

There was no report on Bulletin Boards.

Jane Simkin gave an oral report for the committee on Historical Materials, noting that several members of meeting had been involved in conserving materials from the Benjamin Howland house following its recent demolition.

The Library report was not presented, but had earlier been transmitted electronically to David Connelly by Stephanie Nelson.

The Ministry and Counsel report was presented by Sally Otis. The report will be supplemented with a mention of spiritual nurture groups. Language will also be added regarding the deaths of two members.

There was no report from the Music committee.

The Nominating committee report was presented by Ruth Bradley. She shared a list of nominations, indicating where changes are suggested. There was some discussion of the nominations for the Nominating Committee. Linda Simkin had requested to withdraw and suggested that three year terms for this committee would be appropriate. It was decided that the nominating committee will return to having only three members, each with a three-year term. The meeting appointed Rebecca Schillenback to replace Linda Simkin.



It was noted that a second Representative to the NY Yearly Meeting is needed. David Connelly was suggested. The Nominating committee will contact him. A representative is also needed for NY Yearly Meeting meetings for discernment. The nominating committee will approach Anne Dalton and Melinda Grube.

The persons nominated in the Nominating committee report were appointed by the monthly meeting to the positions for which they were nominated. The list of appointments is appended below. The meeting also approved a change in the name of one committee, from "Prison Oversight Committee" to "Prison Worship Group Contacts".

The Outreach committee report was presented by Anne Dalton.

The Peace and Social Action report was presented by Eric Devin. There was some discussion of

licensing for movie nights. It was suggested that it could be good to get public licenses and use movies as part of outreach efforts. The Peace and Social Action and Outreach committees will follow up.

There was no report from the Prism committee.

For the Prison Worship Group Contacts committee, Dill Otis gave a report concerning the Cayuga Correctional Facility worship group. There was no report concerning the Auburn Correctional Facility.

The report from the Religious Education and Youth committee will, as is usual, be prepared after the annual Children's Day in June.

The Social committee report, written by Hannah Richter, was read by Anne Dalton, together with an addendum to last year's Social Committee report.

There was no report from the Telephone Tree committee.

The Wider Parish committee and Yearly Meeting committee reports were presented by Ruth Bradley.

Anne Dalton will prepare a note thanking Suzanne O'Hara for her work on PRISM this year in difficult family circumstances.

There was a clarification regarding the Funds committee. The committee can approve expenditures between monthly meetings. Every effort should be made to contact all members of the committee, but in the absence of one or more members, action may be taken if two or more are contacted and agree.

A written update on recent insulating work in the Meetinghouse basement, prepared by Larry Buffam, was read by Anne Dalton. Some valuable silverware found during construction will be taken for safeguarding to the home of a family from the meeting.

OFFICE OF THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Friends,

In keeping you informed of the Ministry of Friends Theological College, I write to you today. We are blessed to be in this ministry, and ask for your continued prayers for this work.

At the Friends Theological College (FTC) main campus in Kaimosi, currently there are 32 residential students living on campus as well as 35 students who are part of the Module program. Residential students are on recess from March 18, until April 18, 2016 when they come back. We have enrolled a higher number of new students this April module than the previous year. There a total of 26 students in our Lugulu campus, 8 in Samburu, and 8 in our Nairobi Satellite centers. We anticipate a higher number of student enrollment to our residential program this September 2016. The current total number from all centers including Kaimosi comes to 109 students. However, there are some students, who unfortunately, are unable to return because they are unable to maintain sufficient funding to continue attending the school.

The Module program at FTC is an intensive study program with a usual schedule from April through May. In August, the students in this program return for two to three weeks. Then, they resume their studies once more in December for three to four weeks of intensive study. Overall, FTC is operating three satellite centers in addition to Kaimosi. The satellite centers include Lugulu, Samburu, and the recently opened FTC Nairobi campus with eight students.

RFTC Graduation: On February 25, 2016, I was privileged to travel to Rwanda to participate in the very first graduation of Rwanda Friends Theological College (RFTC) on February 27, 2016. I was there in the company of Jim LeShana, professor and Vice President for Academic Affairs and also Director of Graduate Study, at Barclay College, Iowa. He was there to represent Evangelical Friends Mission, and I represented Friends United Meeting. Jim and I jointly conferred certificates and Diplomas (equivalent of Associate degree) in Pastoral Ministry to 16 students.

One to two students from Rwanda are expected to join FTC Kaimosi in September 2016 for the Bachelor of Theology degree program. Overall, this has helped to cultivate a strong and positive relationship between FTC and RFTC.

Pastors' Workshop in Uganda Yearly Meeting: Margaret Amudavi, the FTC Dean of Academics, and Rodgers Wekesi, lecturer of the Old Testament, and myself, accompanied by FTC student,
