POPLAR RIDGE MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES FOR AUGUST 21, 2016

The Monthly Meeting opened with a period of worship about 11:40 a.m.; the minutes from the July 17 meeting were read.

Attending: Ruth Ann Bradley, Larry Buffam, David Connelly, Jim Frisch, Barry Kahn, Hannah Richter, Heidi Richter, Andrew Simkin, Jane Simkin, and Paul Simkin.

We approved Hannah Richter's request to use Meeting tables and whatever else they need at Heidi Richter's wedding Sept. 17.

Ruth Bradley reported for the Heidi Richter-Drew Schlichtmann marriage Oversight Committee a reminder that the Meetinghouse needs to be in usable order for the Sept. 17 wedding.

Andrew reported that a Clearness Committee was formed for Suzanne O'Hara's request for membership.

The annual report from the Youth Committee was read and attached here.

Larry Buffam reported for the Building Committee that the basement project is moving along and should essentially be done by the Richter-Schlichtmann wedding. He, Peter Dalton, Dave Eckhardt, Ron Buxenbaum, Dil Otis and Andy Simkin have been working on it. The framing and the electrical hookups have been installed and are ready for hanging, finishing and painting drywall during the next few weeks. Howard Nelson has been sanding the front porch area, and Mary Lou and Jack have done painting. Larry asks the Meeting to consider whether portions of the stuccoed stone wall should be retained for appearances or sheet rocked to be plumb.

We have been offered a door from the Benjamin Howland House, the only door believed to be original to the house, considered historically significant. Monthly Meeting agreed to accept it. It was the first Friends Meeting House in Cayuga County. An idea is being considered to use the door, only about 6-foot-two tall, is be displayed as a part of the wall downstairs. There is also considerable usable lumber, for instance to construct furniture, and we could have some of it.

Barry Kahn called attention to an area rug in front of the upstairs bathroom that could be tripped on. The Building Committee will address it.

Local volunteers led by Leah McGonagle will be organizing work on the plantings in front and rear of the Meeting House.

We closed the Monthly Meeting in silence about 12:30 p.m.

Activities this year:

- The committee met the first Tuesday of each month, excepting August, at the Lockharts' house.
- Our primary objective is to support our youngest Friends in their life at Poplar Ridge. Maintaining a substantive curriculum is difficult because of the small numbers of children regularly attending and their wide range of ages. It is not unusual for no children to attend on any given week. This year we kept

to the simple schedule of 1) Introductions; 2) Sharing News; 3) Reading a Story; 4) Having a Snack; 5) Taking part in an arranged activity or in free play. The committee recognizes that we need to balance this reality with modeling Quaker values in First Day School, possibly keeping to a month-long "theme" throughout the year and choosing stories and activities that fit with it.

- Charlie Weld is our long-time primary First Day Leader with other helpers providing stories and activity ideas. We instituted a monthly helper schedule which was posted on the back wall of the Meetinghouse Room and also shared on DropBox.
- Fifth Sundays have become an additional way to provide program to the children through a multi-generational meeting run by the Youth Committee. Instead of doing all five 5th Sundays for this calendar year, because of scheduling conflicts, our committee ran two, in August and January. The January program involved the Syrian Refugee Care Kits the Schillenback family had been participating in, part of a larger regional Friends effort. During the program, the children made cards with messages to accompany the kits.
- Our annual Halloween party was on Saturday, October 24 from 4:30-7:30. About 50 people attended, and we made about \$150 for UNICEF. The amount of work involved means we need to have more volunteers next year, scheduled for different time slots. We were very grateful to have Tara Arpino as fortune teller again this year, with Hannah Richter and Larry Buffam making delicious pizza for the crowd.
- Our Christmas Pageant and Gifts from Santa evening fell on Sunday, December 20 at 5pm. Cathy Mullarney planned the pageant and provided music. After the pageant, the Youth Committee and Social Committee coordinated a simple supper followed by the visit by Santa, played by Craig Kukuk, and his chief elf Scott Lockhart. Twenty-five children received gifts from Meeting members.
- Easter Multigenerational Egg Hunt after Meeting on March 27, an annual treat for the children, went off as usual with eggs provided by Scott Lockhart and hiding provided by the children.
- YSOP this year was accomplished with guiding help from Sally Otis to get the ball rolling,

Alyssa Binns Gunderson as Point Person, Howard and Zack Nelson as chaperones, and three students taking part. They shared their experiences at Children's Day.

- Farmington-Scipio Regional Spring Gathering took place at Watson Homestead from May 14 to May 16. This year our Meeting was in charge of the Youth Program for the weekend. Our committee began its planning at Winter Gathering in January in Rochester. Kathleen Connelly and Julie Lockhart took the lead with full support of the rest of the committee. The program was designed for three age groups – nursery headed by Rebecca Damiani, Ruth-Ann Bradley and Karen Brennan; elementary run by Scott Lockhart, Charlie Weld and Alyssa Binns-Gunderson; and teens headed by Greg Lockhart and Rebecca Schillenback. We had many Poplar Ridge kids attending and adults helping, including a workshop for the teens on diversity by A.T. Miller, along with volunteers from other Meetings. Approximately 27 children took part in the program with the teens comprising the largest group.
- Children's Day took place on June 26. Sally Otis ran the Meeting and prepared a scrapbook for Ella Pearl Gunderson. Rebecca Damiani presented a Godly Play activity titled, "John Wolman Visits the Indians at Wyalusing." Cathy Mullarney played flute and piano with Patrick Connelly performing a cello solo. The YSOP participants shared their experience in New York City in April. Kathleen Connelly prepared the program. Dill Otis provided beautiful marigolds for the children to distribute among the Meeting participants. The Meeting Annual Picnic followed immediately at Suzanne O'Hara's farm


